
- Two Truths and a Lie: Students take turns telling three statements about themselves, two of which are true and one of which is a lie. The other students have to guess which statement is the lie.



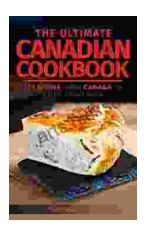


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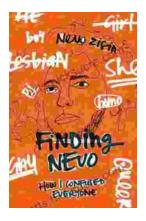
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
